Newly Released Webinar Series Cleft Lip and/or Palate During the First Year of Life (Part one)

In May 2024, Boston Children's Hospital clinicians recorded a two-part informational webinar series discussing various aspects of care during the first year of life of a child with a cleft lip and/or palate. This series was created as an educational tool for families to help navigate the diagnosis of cleft lip and/or palate and to discuss specialized newborn care, feeding tips and tricks, preparing for surgery and post-operative recovery. Prenatal Diagnosis, Tests, and Follow Ups

Olivia Oppel, RN, BSN, is a Clinical Coordinator in the Maternal Fetal Care Center at Boston Children's Hospital and works with families who have received a prenatal diagnosis of cleft lip and/or palate. In the first part of the webinar series, she discusses how a prenatal diagnosis is made, prenatal testing that may be done, and necessary follow up prenatal care visits. Olivia is a vital resource to expectant mothers and their families.



Newborn Care, Feeding, and Screening

Nicolette Bushman, DNP, is a Pediatric Nurse Practitioner in the Department of Plastic & Oral Surgery at Boston Children's Hospital and is a member of the Cleft Lip & Palate team. She meets with families prenatally to discuss feeding tips and techniques and helps families navigate feeding and any other challenges throughout the first year of life. During her portion of the webinar, Nicolette discusses newborn care, feeding techniques and screening processes.

Social Work in the Cleft Medical Community

Remembering Priscilla Coffin

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of one of FFC's founding members, Priscilla "Prilla" Coffin, a devoted parent, friend and contributing member of the Foundation for over 40 years.

Prilla became involved when her son was born with cleft lip/palate and hemifacial microsomia, a condition that came as a surprise to her and her husband. At the time, I was just beginning my nursing career in plastic surgery, so teaching parents how to care for their affected children was new to me. Prilla taught me so much about the effect children with complex needs had on parents. As the years went by, Prilla volunteered in the clinics and helped other parents navigate the system. She remained involved by coordinating educational programs for parents and medical staff. Over the last several years, Prilla donated funds that allowed for scholarships to send Craniofacial/Cleft children to attend summer camp; helping others that needed support and fulfilling what she felt was her "duty" as a parent and a member of the craniofacial community.

Prilla was a remarkable woman and will be sorely missed by the Foundation's community. Our deepest condolences are offered to her family.


